

11- The demands to conform, stereotypes and vision of women's behaviors are the causes of these problems / difficulties

Indeed, we know that during the 19th and 20th century, women were considered as beings born to be housewives and mothers. Thus, they couldn't be independent of their own opinion on advanced concepts.

We can observe this patriarchal view of women and these stereotypes that ask of women to be perfect, submissive and to behave irreproachably in the three documents.

↳ The first one represents two wonderful women who suit the standards of beauty (perfect nose and mouth, blond/brown hair, jewels, beautiful smile and intense gaze)

↳ On the other side the documents B and C corroborate the idea that young girls have to be examples and mustn't be disrespectful or troublesome. Indeed, we can see in document B that Jane Eyre is considered as a liar, a deceitful being who causes troubles, who's naughty and bad just because she speaks her thoughts, rebels and is not content with oppression, inequality and hardship. Brontë says for example that Mrs. Reed "was obliged to separate her from her own young ones" (19) because she wasn't obedient. The document C agrees on that point, by showing a young girl who's going to be punished. In fact, we can see through the door in the top right-hand corner a man (the director of the school) and a woman (probably her mother) who are probably talking about her behavior and telling that she doesn't act like a young lady.
